Even though we are postponing Eliot's in-person launch, we still had a few questions to ask him about the new book. Here is what he had to say!

MLB: Without giving too much away, what will fan's of the Bone Ratter series be most excited about in this new release?

Eliot: The King's Beast features a fascinating conjunction of scientific and political events that reflect the dynamic of this important pre-Revolution period. Readers will have to follow mysterious bones of Ice Age creatures all the way to the home of Benjamin Franklin in London, and discover the political significance of the 1769 astronomical event called the Transit of Venus.

MLB: What are the resources you use for your extensive research in your books?

Eliot: One of the wonderful things about writing novels set in this time is the amazing range of resources available to flesh out the details of day-to-day life. I visit most of the places I describe in person, read many newspapers and magazines of the period, and of course read many, many nonfiction accounts, including first person chronicles. This time was marked by an explosion of scientific, political and literary activity that

make it, for me at least, one of the most fascinating periods of our history.

MLB: We have also been receiving a lot of inquiries as to whether or not there will be another Inspector Shan installment, can you add anything here?

Eliot: For now there are no plans to publish another Shan novel, although I am working on a new novel that will build on other characters in the tenth Inspector Shan.

MLB: What are you currently reading for entertainment and/or research?

Eliot: I am listening to Bernard Cornwell's latest installment in his <u>Saxon Tales</u> and reading a lot of Scottish and Viking history books--I typically am reading two or three books at a time. The Vikings get too easily dismissed as roaming raiders but in fact they had a remarkable culture with a deep focus on the natural and spiritual worlds.

We asked Samantha some questions about her books and what is coming in the future (think movie options), here is what she had to say:

MLB: Your books include the entire family in the action, what is your inspiration for your books and is it your own family (joke, but maybe not really)?

Samantha: In this book, I really wanted to explore family dynamics, how they affect each generation and how certain behaviors are adopted from one to the next. I think this is true of all families, including my own, though certainly not to this degree! Families are always interesting to write about, especially siblings. Unlike the

person you marry, you can't choose your siblings. We all have to find a way to make it work--or not!

MLB: Nicole Kidman and Amazon Studios recently optioned the film rights to your debut *My Lovely Wife*. Who do you think they should cast to play Millicent and her husband?

Samantha: Well, I would love for Nicole Kidman to play the role! That would be amazing. For her husband, I would pick either Jon Hamm or Brad Pitt. But if it's not Nicole, I would also love to see Jessica Chastain as Millicent and Jake Gyllenhall as her husband. Either way, I would be happy!

MLB: What are your you most excited about with your upcoming release, He Started It?

Samantha: I'm always excited to see people's interpretations of the book. With *My Lovely Wife*, some people asked questions about things I had never thought about and that was really fun. It gives a whole new dimension to the book. Can't wait to see what people come up with for this one! *He Started It* is largely about siblings and their relationships with one another. I'm also anxious to see who can relate (to some of it, at least!)

MLB: What are you reading write now and who is your favorite author?

Samantha: Right now, I am reading Araminta Hall's new book *Imperfect Women*. It comes out in June and I already love it. My favorite author is Daphne du Maurier. She wrote my favorite book of all-time, *Rebecca*.



The Paragon Hotel by Lindsay Fave


(Penguin, \$17.00)

The year is 1921, and "Nobody" Alice James has just arrived in Oregon with a bullet wound, a lifetime's experience battling the New York Mafia, and fifty thousand dollars in illicit cash. She

befriends Max, a black Pullman porter who reminds her achingly of home and who saves Alice by leading her to the Paragon Hotel. But her unlikely sanctuary turns out to be an all-black hotel in a Jim Crow city, and its lodgers seem unduly terrified of a white woman on the premises.

As she meets the churlish Dr. Pendleton, the stately Mavereen, and the club chanteuse Blossom Fontaine, she understands their dread. The Ku Klux Klan has arrived in Portland in fearful numbers--burning crosses, electing officials, infiltrating newspapers, and brutalizing blacks. And only Alice and her new Paragon "family" are searching for a missing mulatto child who has mysteriously vanished into the woods. To untangle the web of lies and misdeeds around her, Alice will have to answer for her own past, too.

A richly imagined novel starring two indomitable heroines, *The Paragon Hotel* at once plumbs the darkest parts of America's past and the most redemptive facets of humanity. From international-bestselling, multi-award-nominated writer Lyndsay Faye, it's a masterwork of historical suspense.



Design for Dying: A Lillian Frost & Edith Head Novel by Renee Patrick

(Forge Books, \$17.99)
Los Angeles, 1937. Lillian Frost has traded dreams of stardom for security as

a department store salesgirl . . . until she discovers she's a suspect in the murder of her former roommate, Ruby Carroll. Party girl Ruby died wearing a gown she stole from the wardrobe department at Paramount Pictures, domain of Edith Head.

Edith has yet to win the first of her eight Academy Awards; right now she's barely hanging on to her job, and a scandal is the last thing she needs. To clear Lillian's name and save Edith's career, the two women join forces.

Unraveling the mystery pits them against a Hungarian princess on the lam, a hotshot director on the make, and a private investigator who's not on the level. All they have going for them are dogged determination, assists from the likes of Bob Hope and Barbara Stanwyck, and a killer sense of style. In show business, that just might be enough.

The first in a series of riveting behind-the-scenes mysteries, Renee Patrick's Design for Dying is a delightful romp through Hollywood's Golden Age.




<u>I'll Be Gone In The Dark by</u> <u>Michelle McNamara</u>

(Harper Collins, \$17.99)

For more than ten years, a mysterious and violent predator committed fifty sexual assaults in Northern California before moving south, where he perpetrated ten sadistic murders. Then

he disappeared, eluding capture by multiple police forces and some of the best detectives in the area. Three decades later, Michelle McNamara, a true crime journalist who created the popular website TrueCrimeDiary.com, was determined to find the violent psychopath she called "the Golden State Killer." Michelle pored over police reports, interviewed victims, and embedded herself in the online communities that were as obsessed with the case as she was.

I'll Be Gone in the Dark—the masterpiece McNamara was writing at the time of her sudden death—offers an atmospheric snapshot of a moment in American history and a chilling account of a criminal mastermind and the wreckage he left behind. It is also a portrait of a woman's obsession and her unflagging pursuit of the truth. Utterly original and compelling, it has been hailed as a modern true crime classic—one which fulfilled Michelle's dream: helping unmask the Golden State Killer.



Murder At The Breakers by Alyssa Maxwell (Kensington, \$7.99)

Newport, Rhode Island, August 1895: She may be a less well-heeled relation, but as second cousin to millionaire patriarch

Cornelius Vanderbilt, twenty-one-year-old Emma Cross is on the guest list for a grand ball at the Breakers, the Vanderbilts' summer home. She also has a job to do—report on the event for the society page of the *Newport Observer*.


But Emma observes much more than glitz and gaiety when she witnesses a murder. The victim is Cornelius Vanderbilt's financial secretary, who plunges off a balcony faster than falling stock prices. Emma's black sheep brother Brady is found in Cornelius's bedroom passed out next to a bottle of bourbon and stolen plans for a new railroad line. Brady has barely come to before the police have arrested him for the murder. But Emma is sure someone is trying to railroad her brother and resolves to find the real killer at any cost . . .



Mr. Churhill's Secretary: A Maggie Hope Mystery by Susan Elia MacNeal (Bantam, \$16.00)

London, 1940. Winston Churchill has just been sworn in, war rages across the Channel, and the threat of a Blitz looms larger by the day. But none of this deters

Maggie Hope. She graduated at the top of her college class and possesses all the skills of the finest minds in British intelligence, but her gender qualifies her only to be the newest typist at No. 10 Downing Street. Her indefatigable spirit and remarkable gifts for codebreaking, though, rival those of even the highest men in government, and Maggie finds that working for the prime minister affords her a level of clearance she could never have imagined—and opportunities she will not let pass. In troubled, deadly times, with air-raid sirens sending multitudes underground, access to the War Rooms also exposes Maggie to the machinations of a menacing faction determined to do whatever it takes to change the course of history.



The Silent Patient by Alex Michaelides (Celadon Books, \$16.99)

Alicia Berenson's life is seemingly perfect.
A famous painter married to an in-demand fashion photographer, she lives in a grand house with big windows overlooking a park in one of London's most desirable areas. One evening her

husband Gabriel returns home late from a fashion shoot, and Alicia shoots him five times in the face, and then never speaks another word.

Alicia's refusal to talk, or give any kind of explanation, turns a domestic tragedy into something far grander, a mystery that captures the public imagination and casts Alicia into notoriety. The price of her art skyrockets, and she, the silent patient, is hidden away from the tabloids

and spotlight at the Grove, a secure forensic unit in North London.

Theo Faber is a criminal psychotherapist who has waited a long time for the opportunity to work with Alicia. His determination to get her to talk and unravel the mystery of why she shot her husband takes him down a twisting path into his own motivations—a search for the truth that threatens to consume him....

Thomas Dunne Book for St. Martin's Griffin, \$9.99)


Where: A quiet fishing village in northern lceland, where no one locks their doors. It is accessible only via a small mountain tunnel.

Who: Ari Thor is a rookie policeman on his first posting, far from his girlfriend in Reykjavik. He has a past that he's unable to leave behind.

What: A young woman is found lying half-naked in the snow, bleeding and unconscious, and a highly esteemed elderly writer falls to his death. Ari is dragged straight into the heart of a community where he can trust no one, and secrets and lies are a way of life.

Past plays tag with the present and the claustrophobic tension mounts, while Ari is thrust ever deeper into his own darkness—blinded by snow and with a killer on the loose.

Taut and terrifying, *Snowblind* is a startling debut from Ragnar Jonasson, an extraordinary new talent.

So when Pamela decides to stage a soiree in the empty apartment, Jerry goes along begrudgingly. But what seems inconvenient becomes felonious the moment they find a dead man in the tub. He has been bludgeoned, stripped naked, and left to rot. The party is most certainly off.

Which neighbor was rude enough to leave a body in the upstairs tub? Though they should know better, Mr. and Mrs. North can't resist getting involved. Before they know it, they're right in the thick of a manhunt, and Greenwich Village will never be the same.

Emmeline Lake and her best friend Bunty are doing their bit for the war effort and trying to stay cheerful, despite the German planes making their nightly raids.


Emmy dreams of becoming a Lady War Correspondent, and when she spots a

job advertisement in the newspaper she seizes her chance; but after a rather unfortunate misunderstanding, she finds herself typing letters for the formidable Henrietta Bird, renowned advice columnist of Woman's Friend magazine.

Mrs. Bird is very clear: letters containing any Unpleasantness must go straight into the bin. But as Emmy reads the desperate pleas from women who many have Gone Too Far with the wrong man, or can't bear to let their children be evacuated, she begins to secretly write back to the readers who have poured out their troubles.

Long Bright River is a current mystery about the hunt find a killer to solve a string of murders, but is so much more. It tackles the opioid crisis that plagues so many and delves into the relationship between two sisters. The sisters are multi-dimensional characters with a complex relationship.

While I wondered who the killer was, I was most interested in how the relationship between the sisters would unfold.

The book tackles the topic of addiction with honesty and how two sisters with the same upbringing can become such different adults. I would recommend this book for anyone that likes mystery or enjoys literary fiction. This will be one of my must-read books of 2020.
