Here's how some local businesses are providing online services to help keep our kids minds & bodies active and engaged while we are staying at home.

<u>Homegrown Yoga Oakmont</u>



Local Yoga studio, Homegrown Yoga in Oakmont, is sharing online Kids Yoga classes on their YouTube channel to help keep our young readers mind & bodies engaged.

We asked co-owner and Oakmont resident, Katie Lascola, to tell us about their kids Yoga program. We also asked her what are her family's favorite books to read. Here is what she had to say:

"I am certified in Kids Yoga through Yoga Playground and have been teaching in studios, K-12 schools and preschools for 10 years, through yoga songs, stories and games.

I believe strongly that yoga teaches kids to understand how they can control their bodies and to learn balance and strength. Yoga also teaches them how to understand their emotions and how to deal with them appropriately. And finally, yoga teaches kids to focus and control their breath.

At Homegrown Yoga, we offer Kids Yoga once a month on Friday evenings from 6:00-7:00pm, the cost is \$8 per child. You can find the Kids Yoga dates on our website www.homegrownyogaoakmont.com.

Adults are welcome to stay with the child and either watch or participate too. If the child is over 5, the adult may drop them off for an hour.

As for now with the studio closed, my children and I are recording Kids Yoga classes which you can find on the Homegrown Yoga YouTube station.

Our favorite books to read are any and all of the Mr. Lemmoncello books (by Chris Grabenstein). They are fun, entertaining and great for boys and girls of all ages!"

Octicorn Party! is for anyone who's ever felt just a little bit different...which, as it turns out, is pretty much all of us.




Tyrannosaurus Wrecks by Stuart Gibbs

In the latest novel in Stuart Gibbs's FunJungle series, Teddy Fitzroy returns as FunJungle's resident sleuth to solve his most improbable mystery yet—with a victim that's 65 million years old.

With easy-to-read language and illustrations on almost every page, the Adventures of Sophie Mouse chapter books are perfect for beginning readers.




Godie Vancy: The Hotel Whodunit by Lilliam Rivera

If We Were Giants by Dave Matthews & Clete Barret Smith

A devastated Kirra is found by a boy named Luwan and adopted into his family, which lives among others high in the trees of a dense forest. Now quiet and withdrawn, Kirra hides her dark past from everyone and never wants to leave the safety of her tree dwelling. Luwan, on the other hand, loves to explore. One day it leads to trouble: He is captured while spying on a group of strangers. The Takers have returned.

To save the Tree Folk, Kirra must face her inner demons and summon all her storytelling to weave the most important tale of her life.




Clap When You Land by Elizabeth

Wayside School Beneath the Cloud of Doom (Wayside School #4) by Louis Sachar, illus. by Tim Heitz (HarperCollins, Mar.) – Wayside gets even wonkier in this first series installment since 1995, wherein an ominous cloud settles over the building and the curiosities of Mrs. Jewls's 30th-floor classroom multiply.



Ways to Make Sunshine by Renée Watson (Bloomsbury, April) – In this series opener, a loose reimagining of Ramona Quimby's exploits, Watson adroitly captures the uncertainty of growing up amid change through the eyes of an irrepressible black girl named Ryan.



Stepping Stones (Peapod Farm #1) by Lucy Knisley (Random House Graphic, May) – Graphic novelist Knisley makes her middle grade debut with this contemporary trilogy opener about a city girl navigating her new country home and new place in her changing family.



The List of Things That Will Not Change, by Rebecca Stead (Random/Lamb, April) – Via a layered first-person narration and nuanced interpersonal dynamics, Stead tells the story of Bea, whose divorcing parents give her a green notebook containing "The List of Things That Will Not

Change" to help her navigate her shifting familial landscape.



Child of the Universe by Ray Jayawardhana, illus. by Raul Colón (Make Me a World, Mar.) – In a luminous journey through the cosmos, astrophysicist Jayawardhana and illustrator Colón imagine a child as the actual

embodiment of elemental science: a figure who is at home in—and made up of—the farthest reaches of the universe.



Hello, Neighbor! The Kind and Caring World of Mister Rogers
by Matthew Cordell (Holiday
House/Porter, May) – Caldecott
Medalist Cordell offers the first
authorized picture book biography

of Mister Rogers and his beloved television neighborhood, exploring the complexity of life with Rogers's warmth and empathy.



Everyone's Awake by Colin Meloy, illus. by Shawn Harris (Chronicle, Mar.) – Things start quietly but soon escalate into chaos in Meloy and Harris's comic bedtime romp. Far from heading off to sleep, "The dog's into the eggnog:/ Mom's tap dancing to Prince/ while Dad is on the laptop/

buying ten-yard bolts of chintz."
